


The Falling of Dusk


Hacktivism and Black creativity

On 1 March, Al expert Henry Ajder mapped the ways generative Al and synthetic media are already transforming society and explored the key challenges that will define our digital lives.




Beyond online safety




Senior Research Associate Tyler Shores launches new edX course on Digital Wellbeing and Productivity

The Curiosity Incubator at the Intellectual Forum: an 'Accelerator for Good'

On 24-25 January, Intellectual Forum Senior Research Associate Bridget Gildea held the pilot of her Curiosity Incubator, an 'Accelerator for Good' which, instead of testing business ideas or individual capabilities to make a profit, accelerates the testing of ideas for solutions to our biggest problems. Intellectual Forum Director Dr Julian Huppert attended the Curiosity Incubator pilot, and shares his experience below.









Part of the mission of the Intellectual Forum is to make a positive difference in the world – a very broad and lofty aspiration! I was therefore delighted when one of our Senior Research Associates, Bridget Gildea – an experienced leadership trainer and educator, now a 'Consultant for Good' – suggested that we try running a new type of incubator and accelerator: one aimed at achieving positive social outcomes.

Cambridge is a globally-known centre of innovation, with pioneering companies such as Arm, CMR surgical, Raspberry Pi, and many others. It also benefits from a wonderful ecosystem of innovation centres such as Start Codon and O2h. These will help build a company – and especially a high-growth company – from any appropriate idea.

But what if your idea, or the problem you need to solve, isn't addressed by creating a high-growth company? What if the answer is a new policy approach, or a new way of running your organisation, or making some ideas freely available so they can change the world?


That's where Bridget's concept comes in. The aim is to create an 'Accelerator for Good' that will help to develop transformational ideas, whether or not they lead to a profit-making company. The ideas and challenges might come from academics, or NGOs, or community organisations, or just about anyone who wants to make some part of our world better. The first step, however, is to work out the questions.



Too often, people and organisations leap straight from the title of the problem to trying to answer it, without really thinking through what the challenges actually are. So Bridget designed a Curiosity Incubator to help develop that part of the necessary thinking. I was privileged to take part in and host the pilot of this Curiosity Incubator at the end of a cold January at Jesus College. It was a small but well-formed group, including Sir Tim Smit of the Eden Project; a senior Director from the Open Society Foundation; the Founder of the excitingly-named Gorilla Experiment Builder ('a better survey monkey'); an expert on entrepreneurship working with the World Health Organisation; and others.

In a fairly short space of time – starting with lunch one day and finishing earlyish on the next – I learned a huge amount. We heard about behavioural science and what it tells us about how to think about identifying and solving problems, including real world examples. We reflected on how to unWEIRDify it – making surethere are approaches which don't only work in Western, Educated, Industrialised, Rich, and Democratic Societies. We interacted creatively as a team, having to express each other's problems and challenges pictorially. I came away with a wide range of ideas for how to tackle my own personal challenge – how to help bridge the gap between academia and academics, and the real world and real problems. This pilot was brilliant, and I'm delighted that Jesus College and the Intellectual Forum were able to catalyse such an excellent event, which on its own will make a difference. And it's not over yet: we have more Curiosity Incubators to come – and then the full Accelerator!







SRA David Tyrrall analyses data for Society of Independent Brewers (SIBA) Craft Beer Report

The SIBA Craft Beer Report is the most definitive annual look at the independent craft beer market in the UK and the challenges faced by the country's independent brewers. This is the fourth such report that SIBA has produced.

The aim of the SIBA Craft Beer Report is to offer insight and ideas that SIBA members and retail customers can take away and consider when making strategic decisions. David Tyrrall teamed up with Professor Geoff Pugh, Professor of Applied Economics at Staffordshire University, to analyse the data for the report. All statistics relating to SIBA brewing members in this report are taken from the annual members' survey as analysed by David and Geoff. Both academics have previously provided research to support the successful campaign to introduce Progressive Beer Duty and more recently worked with SIBA colleagues to inform HMT's reform of Small Breweries' Relief. This latest in-depth members' survey was completed in February 2023 and survey results were compared with those of previous years to highlight trends.

The IF hosts a global Summit on Responsible Al



With the rise of technologies such as ChatGPT and GPT-4, the general public are becoming acutely aware of the importance – and the potential threat – of Artificial Intelligence.

As this awareness grows, so too does the pressure to develop 'Responsible Al': technologies that align trust and safeguarding with fast progress and innovation. With this objective in mind, the Intellectual Forum at Jesus College teamed up with leading Responsible Al software company Mission Control to host an international, pioneering conference bringing together senior private and public sector policy leaders in the field.

The Leaders in Responsible Al Summit 2023 was an intense day-long series of talks and workshops designed to catalyse ideas-sharing and galvanise movement towards practical solutions to some of the most pressing issues of our time.

These central concerns included:

- How AI will shape the near future of the UK and global labour market
- How Responsible AI could help us achieve the UN's Sustainable Development Goals
- How policymakers may better develop informed and effective responses to the growth of AI
- Strategies that teams can employ today to better operationalise Responsible AI.

With over 70 attendees spanning three continents, this was a global event with global impact in mind. Ramsay Brown, CEO of Mission Control, said: "We're in a very unique time right now; as the Global 2000 moves trillions of dollars of value through the Digital Transformation they're facing unique challenges in achieving Al mission success. This sluggish success is happening at the same time as the opening salvos of the age of Artificial General

Intelligence. Both of these historic transformations are happening simultaneously; and both open as many unparalleled opportunities as they do unprecedented risks. Collectively, the global community is under-prepared: economically, technologically, politically, and socially.

"The AI world has dramatically accelerated in the sixteen months since Julian and I planned this Summit. And the imperative for quality, velocity, and trust in AI has only grown. This Summit, the first of our annual series, seeks to align the global community of AI experts and leaders. In doing so, we unite the need for practical solutions with blue sky design thinking to envision a better world with AI."

Dr Julian Huppert, the Director of the Intellectual Forum, said: "The sudden public awareness of the power of generative AI has accelerated the pace with which we need to work out how to handle AI safely and reasonably. This is a huge global challenge and I'm delighted that here at Jesus College we were able to do our part in helping to bring people together to tackle it.

"Al can do many good things; if we get this right it could improve humanity and free us to spend more time being human and flourishing. If we get it wrong, it can worsen inequalities, reduce human flourishing, and perhaps even lead in extremes to civilisational collapse. Let's hope we get it right, and that's what we're trying to do with collaborations like this."

Julian of Norwich: mother, mystic, radical with Dr Claire Gilbert


Thursday 20 April, 19.30, Frankopan Hall and online

The 14th century visionary Julian of Norwich was the first woman, as far as we know, to write in English. Julian is the subject of Claire Gilbert's research and forthcoming book Restoring Porosity: Julian of Norwich and Ecological Consciousness, but when Claire was diagnosed with cancer Julian ceased to be an academic object and became Claire's spiritual companion through two and a half years of gruelling treatment. As the treatment drew to a close, Claire heard what can only be described as a call to tell Julian's story in the first person, in homage to her. Claire will speak about her own 'vision' of Julian's life, which was lived in times as turbulent as our own, and read from her novel.



How to reach a nature-friendly future with Philip Lymbery Wednesday 26 April, 19.30, Webb Library and online

Worldwide we are faced with expansion of industrial farming, where mega-farms, chemicals, and animal cages are jeopardising the air we breathe, the water we drink, the food we eat, and the nature we treasure. The food industry is threatening the planet to extinction: the world's soils could be lost within a lifetime, as issued by the United Nations. This event with Philip Lymbery for the Cambridge University Alternative Protein Project will explore how what we buy and eat affects climate change. Philip will also share his hopes in the pioneers who are battling to bring landscapes back to life, who are rethinking farming methods, rediscovering traditional techniques, and developing technologies to feed the global population.



Closing Ranks: My Life as a Cop with Dr Leroy Logan MBE Wednesday 10 May, 19.30, Frankopan Hall and online

How can we improve relationships between the police and Britain's minority ethnic communities? What can we change to create a more equitable and fair criminal justice system? Dr Leroy Logan MBE was described by The Guardian as "the man who risked everything to fight racism in the police force – from within". He was a former superintendent in the Metropolitan police, and retired in 2013 after 30 years exemplary service. He will discuss his life, his work, and his book, Closing Ranks: My Life as a Cop. Closing Ranks is a history lesson in race relations in modern-day Britain, and a manifesto for anyone with a desire to mentor young people.



Embracing fashion sustainability with Riccardo Bellini


Ai Weiwei on memorials, colonisation, and freedom in art Friday 21 April, 19.30, Frankopan Hall and online

About the speaker

Ai Weiwei is a Chinese contemporary artist, documentarian, and activist. He grew up in the far northwest of China, where he lived under harsh conditions due to his father's exile.

As an activist, he has been openly critical of the Chinese Government's stance on democracy and human rights. In 2011, Ai Weiwei was arrested at Beijing Capital International Airport on 3 April, for "economic crimes", and was detained for 81 days without charge. He emerged as one of the nation's most vocal political commentators and creators, and makes use of Chinese art forms to display Chinese political and social issues.

After being allowed to leave China in 2015, he has lived in Berlin, Germany; Cambridge, UK; and Portugal. Among many other accolades, he received Amnesty International's Ambassador of Conscience Award in 2015 for showing exceptional leadership in the fight for human rights through his life and work.



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
