

# ADVENT CAROL SERVICE

Sunday 26<sup>th</sup> November 2023 6.00pm DVENT is a season of expectation and preparation in the Christian year, as the Church makes ready to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ in his incarnation as a babe in Bethlehem, but also looks forward to his final advent at the consummation of all things. The tone therefore is one of keeping vigil, of watching and waiting with expectation and hope for God's reign of justice, mercy, and peace.

This year's Advent Carol Service traces the theme of expectant attention, beginning with the anticipation and longing of the Hebrew prophets, who call upon God's mercy and help, and exhort us to prepare our hearts and lives for God's glory to dawn on our lives and in our world. Readings and music then reflect on the figure of John the Baptist — seen as the last of those who prepared the way for Christ's coming salvation and judgement, and one who counselled his hearers to be ready to receive Christ when he comes — and the witness of the Virgin Mary, as she receives the news that she will bear the coming Saviour, through the Spirit's gift. The service concludes by looking forward to the promise of Christ's final appearing, in which all darkness will be cast out by his light; all death by his life; all sin by his loving judgement and mercy.

### THE DESIRE AND HOPE OF ISRAEL

Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. ### THE COMING DAY OF THE LORD

Read by the President

OR THIS we declare to you by the word of the Lord, that we who are alive, who are left until the coming of the Lord, will by no means precede those who have died. For the Lord himself, with a cry of command, with the archangel's call and with the sound of God's trumpet, will descend from heaven, and the dead in Christ will rise first. Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up in the clouds together with them to meet the Lord in the air; and so we will be with the Lord for ever. Therefore encourage one another with these words.

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, 'There is peace and security', then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labour pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no

escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then, let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. But since we belong to the day, let us be sober, and put on the breastplate of faith and love, and for a helmet the hope of salvation. For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him.'
