#### **Details**

The Old Library at Jesus College holds thirty-nine incunabular editions bound in thirty-two volumes, ranging in date from 1470 to 1500. An almost equal number were removed by the Master, Lynford Caryl, in 1772, a list of which (extracted from Caryl's own list of removed books) has been placed in the 'lists' folder. An 'edition' is taken to mean an imprint with its own ISTC number – there are two works (3 and 5 above) which are comprised of more than one part, represented by different ISTC numbers. All incunabular editions listed above (numbers 1 to 37) have been catalogued onto Newton, as has the 1501 imprint (Juvenal), which also appears in the ISTC. The earliest imprint, Durandus' *Rationale* is the second edition of the text and is one of 6 copies in the UK. We have three early English imprints; the most important is Andreae's *Scriptum in logica sua* (St Albans: Schoolmaster Printer, about 1481-82), one of only three substantially complete copies known (and not in the BL), this one bound in a contemporary Cambridge blind stamped binding by the 'Unicorn Binder'. The other significant English imprint, Lattebury's *Liber moralium super threnis Ieremiae* (Oxford: Theodoricus Rood, 1482) is less rare, but is known to have been in the library since 1600, when it was donated by fellow Lionel Ducket.

### **Rarity**

There are some very rare books in terms of numbers of surviving copies. The Salisbury Breviary (Paris, 1499) is one of only five (all incomplete) copies known anywhere. The copy of Terence's *Comedies* printed in Paris in 1499 is one of four known copies anywhere (of which two are in the UK). The Latin Bible printed in Cologne by Nicolaus Gotz in 1480 is one of only three complete copies in this country. Three works - the *Practica nova judicialis* of Ferrariis (Lyons, 1477), Martinus Polonus' *Margarita decreti* (Nuremberg, about 1491-93) and *Tractatus plurimi iuris* (Basel, about 1487) - are all one of only two copies in this country. Angelus de Ubaldis' *Consilia et responsa* (Venice, 1487) is the only copy in the UK. Finally, the *Indulgence* printed by John Lettou in 1480 (London), which survives only as strips in the binding of a Latin Bible in the library (A.3.19-20), is unique.

#### **Bindings**

A number of the library's incunabula survive in contemporary or very early 16<sup>th</sup>-century bindings, some blind stamped and therefore identifiable with known binders. There are several early Cambridge bindings, including two by the so-called 'Unicorn Binder', whose bindings are recorded on books printed no later than 1507. The first is E.3.49 (Andreae: *Scriptum in logica sua*, 1481-82), which Hobson (*Bindings in Cambridge Libraries*, 1929 – a copy is in the OL) dated to the binder's early period of c. 1485-1488. This volume was once chained, very possibly in the Old Library itself. The second is O.10.9 (*Summa in virtutes cardinales*: Paris, 1480). Hobson again dates this binding to the early period of c. 1485-1488. The St John's copy of this work is also in a Unicorn binding. K.13.2, part two of Florentinus' *Chronicon* (dated 1512; parts 1 & 3 dated 1491), was bound by another Cambridge binder, Nicholas Spierinck. The animal roll-tool used is recorded on books printed between 1521 and 1533. A.2.50, which contains three different works printed between 1482 and 1491/93, is identifiable with the 'Octagonal Rose Binder', whose bindings are recorded on books printed between 1489 and 1496.

There are other works in early English bindings, although it has not been possible to identify the binders. These include B.13.27 (the two parts of Saxoferrato, printed 1492/3 and 1494), and B.13.30 (which contains the *Decisiones rotae Romanae* and Lanfrancus de Oriano's *Repetitiones*), which is in an early London binding, according to a note inside.

Other early stamped bindings include P.1.33 (the *Decretalia* of Boniface VIII) and P.4.5 (the *Decretalia* of Innocent IV, bound with Pontanus' *Consilia*), and O.6.47 (Duranti's *Rationale* of 1470), the earliest printed book in the library. The various works of William of Auvergne (shelved at C.3.28 and C.3.29) are also in early bindings.

Many of the bindings above, although retaining their original boards, have been more recently rebacked. Platea's *Opus restitutionum* (O.9.25) is bound in contemporary alum-tawed leather over wooden boards and remains in completely original condition.

A number of volumes bear evidence of having once been chained: A.2.50, C.3.27, C.3.29, E.3.49, K.3.1 + 3, C.9.25 and C.9.25 and

## **Provenance**

A few of the library's incunabula have certainly been in the library since the 16<sup>th</sup> century. C.3.27 has the early 16<sup>th</sup>-century inscription 'Liber Collegij Jesu', suggesting that this book has been in the library from the very earliest days. B.13.27 was given by Thomas Broughton in 1578, who matriculated at Jesus in 1575 and gave 10 books in 1578. This is one of the earliest known donations to survive in the library. Some early 17<sup>th</sup>-century donations also remain. F.8.17 is inscribed '*Hugo Williams hujus collegii alumnus...piam memoriam Edwardus Hughes in Theologia licentiatus*, *ejusdem collegii socius*'. These individuals are probably the Hugh Williams who took his BA from Jesus in 1601/2 and the Edward Hughes who matriculated in 1584 and was a fellow 1594-1602. A.2.42 was given in 1600 by Lionel Ducket (MA Jesus 1586; fellow 1585-1603). Charles Lidgould (MA 1721) gave F.1.12 in 1723, and F.3.29 in 1742. He also gave A.3.19-20 at an unspecified date. Charles Ashton (fellow from 1687 and Master 1701-1752) gave M.5.50.
